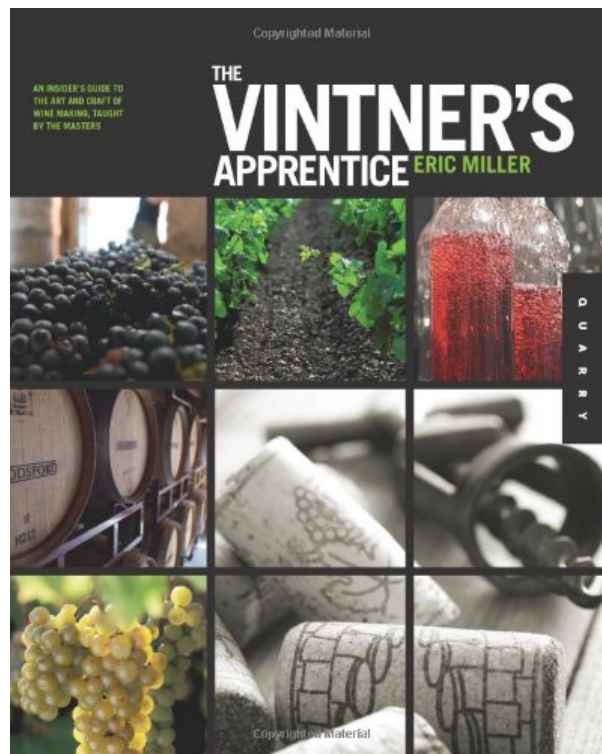
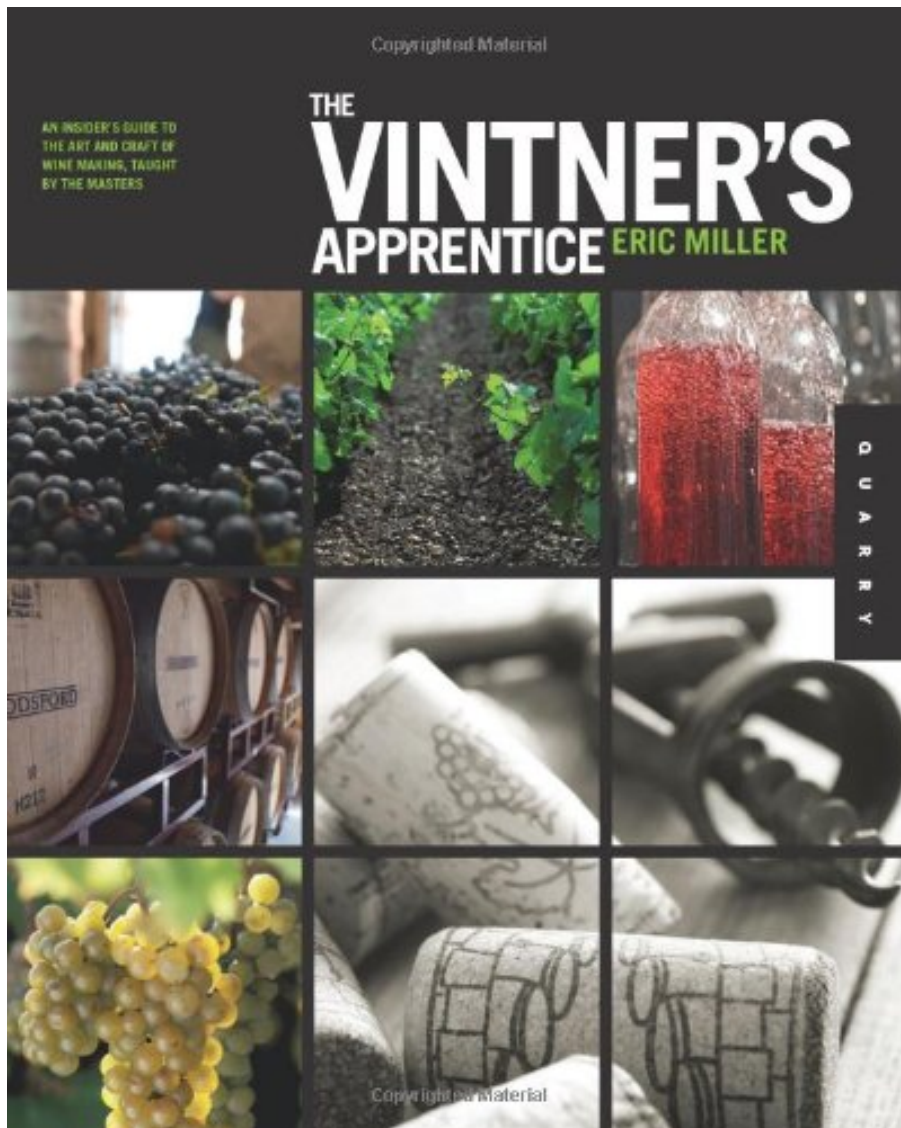

Superb Photographs

I recently published *Creating World Class Red Wine* on Amazon. It is kind of a top-down study of how the finest wines in the world are actually made, and how those grapes are grown--a hands on winemaking book. I read this book, thinking it might be similar, but it's not. It is really a salute to contemporary winemaking and winemakers around the globe. The information is general, and I found the interviews mildly interesting, but must admit that at my level I didn't learn much. I am always interested in what world class winemakers have to say.

Except for a couple out-of-focus images (that cool amphora-shaped concrete fermenter) the photography is gorgeous. *Vintner's Apprentice* is a nice coffee table book.

Glossy and pretty, but shallow

"*The Vintner's Apprentice*" includes only the most basic information about managing vines and making wine. Mr Miller's book delivers much more in the way of style than of substance. It is not so much "an insider's guide to the art and craft of wine making" as it is a basic (albeit prettily done) introduction to the subject. With the exception of viticulturalist Lucie Morton, Mr Miller's interviews with his fellow winemakers add little to the book from an informational standpoint. "*The Vintners Apprentice*" is beautifully illustrated in the manner of a coffee table book, with photographs that appeal to the eye, but too often add little of value by way of supporting the text. If only half the book's photos were removed, I doubt the remaining content would come to 100 pages.

If the reader has gone on a number of winery tours and been good about asking questions he/she will have acquired much of the information "*The Vintners Apprentice*" provides. In fact, having toured Chaddsford with Mr. Miller, I suspect the questions he commonly answers during such tours formed the foundation of this book.

If you're looking for an attractive, high level intro to how a vineyard/winery operates, you may enjoy this book. If you're looking for a guide to wine making, look elsewhere.
